Reform's Declaration Of Independence: The Pittsburgh Platform of 1885 and its Consequences

October 25th with Rabbi Gary P. Zola



In November of 1885, a self-selected group of American rabbis committed to a Reformist approach to Jewish religious practice met in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania to adopt a "Declaration of Principles," which is almost universally known as the "Pittsburgh Platform." Dr. Gary P. Zola, Executive Director of the Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives and the Edward M. Ackerman

Family Distinguished Professor of the American Jewish Experience at Hebrew Union College will explore the fascinating story of how these consequential principles came into being and, also, why this platform is arguably Reform Judaism's most consequential ideological statement.

Chicago Sinai Congregation's prominence in the Reform Movement was fostered by its two most famous and longest serving Rabbis, who together shaped our Temple's distinctive liberal religious and social vision for almost a century- from 1880 through 1962. Their proud successor, Rabbi Howard A. Berman, who led Sinai from 1982-2002, and continues to serve as Rabbi Emeritus, will offer

personal perspectives on how their teaching and community leadership continue to serve as models for the Congregation today, as it enters a new chapter in its colorful 161-year history.

Reform Judaism in Israel: Living the Dream, Facing the Reality

November 29th with Rabbi Josh Weinberg



This session will look at what it means to be Jewish in the Jewish state and address some of the challenges facing liberal and Reform Judaism in Israel over the last 75 years, from a societal and political perspective.

Rabbi Josh Weinberg serves as the Vice President of the URJ for Israel and Reform Zionism and is the Executive

Director of ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America. He was ordained from the HUC-JIR Israeli Rabbinic Program in Jerusalem, and he is currently living in New York. Josh previously served as the Director of the Israel program for the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College, and as a

faculty member of NFTY-EIE High School in Israel teaching Jewish History. Josh is a reserve officer in the IDF spokesperson's unit, has hiked the Israel-trail, and came on Aliyah to Israel in 2003.

Originally from Chicago, he has a B.A. from University of Wisconsin in Hebrew Literature, Political Science and International Relations, and an M.A. at the Hebrew University in Jewish Education.
